Friends and Tax Exemption

To those that have donated, thank you very much. Some potential donors are waiting until **Friends** receives its tax-exempt determination letter from the Internal Revenue Service before making a donation. We would like to clarify a few points:

- The way the US tax code is written, donations from US citizens are tax-exempt while our 501(c)(3) application is pending,
- The tax laws in Canada are different and Canadians can **not** make tax-exempt donations until our tax-exempt status is approved and we sign an agreement with a Canadian company (Tides Canada) to handle tax-exempt donations from Canadian sources.

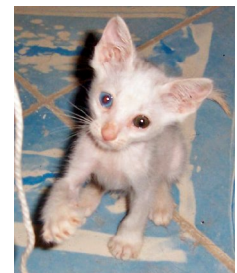
Pledges

Animal Related Health Issues in Manzanillo

It is estimated there are about 13,000 street dogs in Manzanillo. Since each animal defecates between 150 – 300 grams of material daily, they are leaving nearly 7,000 pounds of fecal matter each day on our streets. These feces coupled with the trash spread by marauding packs are breeding grounds for disease and attract other disease carrying critters. Such as rats, cockroaches, flies and mosquitos.

Most of the founding members met in 2007 while working at a 5-day sterilization clinic sponsored by PATA Manzanillo. We became friends and through the years have continued to discuss animal welfare activities in Manzanillo and how to expand them.

This group of friends came to the conclusion that there is a finite amount of money available in Manzanillo to build animal welfare programs necessary to alleviate the suffering. The existing animals groups are pretty close to depleting that pool. Therefore if the programs want to grow to meet the need, someone would have to look for funds outside Manzanillo. So that is why **Friends of PATA Manzanillo** exists.
